<u>May Plate</u> <u>Sharing</u> :	BAG began as a small volunteer effort focused on <u>gleaning as a way to address food insecurity</u> : <u>harvesting</u> <u>surplus crops that would otherwise go to waste, and</u> distributing them to people without access to healthy
Boston Area Gleaners	<u>food</u> . Since the early 2000's, it has grown to become the largest gleaning organization in the northeast, and through their distribution program <u>they deliver fresh food to a</u> <u>network of local food pantries</u> , shelters, and meal programs, and provide trucking support to partner non-profits and

farms in need of resources.

With the support of other organizations, BAG purchased Stonefield Farm in 2021 and developed the <u>Food Hub</u>, a wholesale market for local produce, providing income opportunities for farmers and a much-needed farm-to-institution supply line for local universities, hospitals, and food banks. Their vision is to sustain a permanent agricultural supply chain that will improve the viability of local farms and the health of communities in the Boston metro area who have historically


