

We joined the group to form the ASAIPSAR. We've since provided food and made deliveries to newly arrived Afghan families, created an ongoing food pantry in Lowell, and aligned with the IINE (International Institute of New England) to support a family of six in Lowell and another in Maynard. We're looking for ways to sustain this Interfaith effort and investigating how to help people in Haiti.
