

# <u>April Plate</u> <u>Sharing</u>: Concord Prison Outreach

Concord Prison Outreach (CPO) is a 501(c)(3) organization composed of a coalition of individuals and faith communities committed to helping people who are incarcerated build better lives for themselves and their families. Since its founding in 1968, when its first volunteers helped to support people in a local prison infirmary, CPO has developed into the largest organization of its kind in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. CPO works cooperatively with the

Massachusetts Department of Correction (DOC), offering educational programs that focus on skill-building and personal growth, essentials to help support people in prison to achieve success while incarcerated or post-incarceration.

Recently, CPO has restarted programming in the BRAVE (Building Responsible Adults through Validation and Education) Unit to house 45 young fathers at MCI-Concord. Many of the young fathers have no relationships with their own fathers, or positive role models. Mentors will support these younger men as they work at being fathers themselves, navigate the stressors of prison life, and participate in programming to bolster other areas of their lives. Programming includes mentoring to guide fathers to have healthier relationships with their children.

**"The Worcester County Beekeepers Association" Ken Warchol** of Northbridge, MA belongs to the Worcester County Beekeepers Association (WCBA). Beekeepers have been in his family for six generations going back to the 1840's in Poland. Ken got his first colony when he was six and has owned as many as 120 colonies. He has been the Apiary Inspector for the Mass. Department of Agriculture, a high school teacher in Northbridge retiring in 2008,



and president of the WCBA. In 1985 he was proclaimed Mass. State Beekeeper of the Year. He will give a presentation about the current health of the local bee population and offer samples of fifteen different honeys from around the world for us to taste. Masks will be optional.
