FOR THOSE WHO WANT TO CONNECT BY PHONE:

1. **You'll need three pieces of information: The phone number, the meeting ID and password.**

These change each week, so they can be found in the newsletter under the Sunday service. Occasionally zoom changes this information at a last minute, but you can always call an FPC member or staff member for them. We post them on the website under the Sunday service information if you have web access, and we update the information there when problems arise.

2. **Dial the phone number provided.**

It is a long-distance number, so your carrier rates will apply.

3. **Enter the meeting ID when prompted, followed by #.**

Enter # again if prompted to. If you join too early (before 9:35ish), you'll either be told that it hasn't started and to come back later, or told to press # to wait.

4. **Enter the passcode when prompted followed by a #.**

You may be in a "waiting room" where you won't hear much until shortly before the service

5. **When you hear people introducing themselves, and at joys and sorrows, you can use *6 to unmute yourself and tell people who you are or share your joy or sorrow.**

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COVID PANDEMIC RESPONSE UPDATE

January 2021 Update

As I noted last month, the COVID Planning Task Force has put our protocols and guidelines up on FPC’s website. Please check them out when you get a chance. And please review them if you would like to consider holding any kind of event on FPC’s grounds in the coming months. FPC’s buildings are essentially closed and we will conduct no in-building worship services through June 30, 2021, except as approved by the task force.

The policies, protocols, and recommendations available through our FPC website are “living” documents, and will be updated depending on the current conditions during the COVID-19 pandemic. They include:

- An introduction to FPC's protocols and guidelines for FPC activities under the pandemic;
- Protocols for gathering in the FPC buildings;
- Protocols for gathering outside the FPC buildings yet still on FPC grounds;
- Recommendations for off-site gatherings of FPC member and friends;
- Videos showing proper masking procedures, hand washing, use of the permitted FPC bathroom, and social distancing; and
- Other resources you may find interesting regarding the COVID pandemic.

The COVID Planning Task Force is taking over the responsibility from Rev. Cindy and me for reviewing and approving any gatherings inside the building and on the FPC campus. I will continue to receive requests and then pass them along to the team.

Revised Bylaws & Community Meetings

In January of 2019 (wow, almost two years ago!), following my term as Board President I began working with Hector Constantzos, Brendon Chetwynd, Kevin O'Brien and Katy Weeks on much needed revisions to the Bylaws. Rev. Cindy Landrum served as an advisor. Our task was to streamline the Bylaws, to make them nimbler to changing structures and volunteerism and to align them with current practices. We started to wordsmith the current bylaws and quickly discovered that too much needed to be brought up to date to simply wordsmith so we went for a rewrite. So, therefore, you will not find a copy of the Bylaws with "track changes" as those familiar with Microsoft Word might expect. Instead, we provide an "Executive Summary" of the changes. We will be holding three community meetings to discuss, and answer questions related to the revisions we are recommending to the Bylaws.

There will then be a Special Congregational Meeting called by the Board of Trustees to vote on the revised Bylaws.

Please also note that the Board of Trustees is now working on a Policies and Procedures Compendium to go along with the revised Bylaws and to cover any items that were removed from the Bylaws. Please let me or the other members of the Bylaws Task Force know if you have any questions. We are happy to answer them in advance of the community meetings.

Coming Jan. 30, 2021, a musical presentation on Race in America titled Deeper Than The Skin, by Reggie Harris and Greg Greenway.

Two friends, one Black, one White, born three days apart. The racial divisions that are the reality of America started them in two different worlds, but the amazing bonds of music, respect, admiration and shared vision have brought them together as friends and colleagues.

“Deeper Than The Skin” is an experience of singing and listening, It is an invitation to open your heart and mind to a story of shared humanity that resonates with your own.

As Reggie and Greg reach across the racial divide, they encourage others to foster the relationships that are, in the end, a path to healing.
